What exactly does a CASA do?

As a Court Appointed Special Advocate, you are assigned to an abuse or neglect case by a judge. You will conduct thorough research on the background of the case by reviewing documents and interviewing everyone involved - including the child. A CASA volunteer provides judges with information that will help them make informed decisions about the cases so that the children can be placed in a loving, permanent home.

What about training?

Training is vital to becoming a CASA volunteer. After completing an application and talking with CASA staff, potential volunteers must complete 30 hours of pre-service training. In training, you will learn about courtroom procedure, social services and the juvenile court system.

What is a CASA volunteer?

CASA means Court Appointed Special Advocate - a trained community volunteer appointed by a judge to speak up for abused and neglected children in court.

Who are Advocates?

They are everyday people who care about children. A volunteer is at least 21 years old and must pass a criminal background check.

CASA Volunteers come from all walks of life. Many work full time, some are college students, and some are retired. No legal expertise is required.
